## GRADUATE COUNCIL

The Graduate Council met for the second time (in its history) on Monday last. Two subjects of interest to the general student body arose. First, the Dean announced that due to security reasons (theft, vandalism, and threats to personnel) all of the outside doors, except the southwest corner one, will soon be locked. A receptionist will be placed at the southwest door to "check" people coming in. There have been a number of vandalous acts (the telephone was ripped out...a rip off..., and drapes were torn down) and a number of women have had unfortunate incidents with males in the women's washroom...purse snatching, that is. Hopefully locking the doors will halt this activity.

The second area of interest was the status of the Assembly of Students and the Student Council with respect to the Graduate Council. The Assembly of Students voted to make the Graduate Council Student-Members a committee of the Student Council but, the Graduate Council interprets this as a communication association only. The point is simple. As far as the Dean is concerned the Graduate Council (5 students - 5 faculty) is an adequate substitute for the Student Council. As a result the Graduate Council students have been ratified by him as the Student Government. The Assembly of Students is not ratifiable if Special Students are involved. Hence, it makes no difference that 25 or so voted for the Graduate Council members and that that election was overseen by the faculty administration. Those elected representatives are far more representative than students elected by a majority of students in an election run by students themselves. The questions we should ask, then, are: "Do we need a Sponsor Teacher for the Student Council?", and, "Can we hold a sock hop in the auditorium at noon as a pep rally for the senior prom?"

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IN AND OUT AT A.S.C.

How does one get in and out? ASC is one of the hardest buildings to get into -- officially; one of the easiest -- physically. Keys for doors are impossible to get. Student Council has had requests from students to change this. Nothing yet. If any lab students, for example, wish to work on their projects, films or TV, they may only do so during the week days. If they are in the building when it closes at night, they can stay and work all night; but, if they leave they can't get back in. Considering the facilities needed to do any media work and the cost of these facilities,

it would seem that greater use of the facilities we have would mean a more efficient use of the school. This has been shown, over and over again, not to be the case. There are many facilities: recording rooms, graphics, cameras, televisions, darkrooms, etc. which are available and not being utilized. Some things are just a step from being useful -- a slide copier is missing a \$5 connector, portable TV equipment is shy 1/2 in. video tape, a silk screen film, etc... That which is utilized is to a minimal extent. So too for the entire University. Buildings are closed because of additional staff costs. Students pay for the buildings with their fees and get no use because of short hours (remember the old saying, "Caveat emptor" or, "You pays your money and you takes your chances.") The gyms close at 6:00 or 8:00 (depending on day) and libraries close at 5:00 or 9:00 (ASC) or 12:00. These are huge facilities with millions of dollars, and hardly utilized 50% of the time. ASC is the same. The capital built the palace and none was left to help run it. Why not give each ASC student a master key for the whole building? At least those who want them? A few situation-limiting building uses even more will soon become "law" (See lead article). What then? I enjoy pointing out a certain logical thought about building security: There will be no building damage and no problem with stealing or accepting if no one is allowed in the building. But then, why have a building if no one is allowed to use it? Let's make full use of what we have!
